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In that region there were shepherds living in the fields, keeping watch over their flock by night. And the part I loved best was when Linus would drape his blanket over his head as a shepherd in the play, then recite the nativity under a single spotlight. I didn't understand why this was powerful until much later in life.

It has always fascinated me that the first people Jesus met, after his parents, were the Shepherds. We aren't told how many of them there were. They tend to get forgotten in the mash up of Christmas (birth) and the Epiphany (gifts and wise guys).

God chose Shepherds first. Before the Wise Men or the rich

and powerful, The angel Gabriel appeared to the Shepherds and gave the standard greeting "Don't be scared". You know something is happening when the angel says "Be Not Afraid". And yet those shepherds overcame their fears, they believed the angel and when the star appeared, they made their way to see the baby Jesus, in a stable, swaddled in clean rags, lying in a food trough. God chose them because they were ordinary folks. Not the smartest, not the wealthiest. The most caring. They had a commitment to their flocks, to each other, and to God. Thus, Gabriel delivered one of the greatest messages the world would ever receive.

We have formed deep relationships with one another and especially with God. Whether we worship together in the same space, in person, or online, we gather together, as often as we can, to celebrate the seasons of the Church together. A commitment made to God and each other.
